

Who is the Creator? You have probably known of Him for years, and yet we have been humbled and blessed to be able to introduce Him to you by Name. Amos tells us the Creator's Name is YeHoVaH.

For, lo, He that formeth the mountains, and createth the wind, and declareth unto man what is His thought, that maketh the morning darkness, and treadeth upon the high places of the earth, YHVH, The Mighty One of hosts, is His name, Amos 4:13. Please see also Amos 5:8 and Amos 9:6.

As Creator, do you accept that YHVH created what we understand as time? While not Himself bound by time constraint, man was certainly created to be bound by time. We cannot escape it--even in death. Since He created all things, including time, if you accept His Creatorship, do you also accept His demands of your time? The Almighty has asked you for the seventh day of every week (Genesis 2:1-3, Exodus 20:8-11, and Exodus 34:21) and for seven special days out of each year (Exodus 23:14-17, 34:18, 22-23, Deuteronomy 16:1, 9-10, 13-16, and all of Leviticus chapters 16 and 23).

If you turned to each passage in Scripture rather than just read the list of texts we have listed above, you had to have grasped that these appointed times are holy, consecrated, solemn and sanctified-a day in which no work was to be done for it was hallowed time. The same language used to describe the weekly Sabbath is used to describe the seven annual Sabbaths. Many times the words season (i.e. Genesis 1:14, Psalm 104:19); or feast (i.e. Leviticus 23:2, Hosea 12:9) and sometimes congregation (i.e. Isaiah 14:13, 1 Kings 8:4) are translated into English from the Hebrew word mo'ed. Literally, mo'ed means "time appointed" or "set time" (i.e. Daniel 8:19, Habakkuk 2:3, Psalm 102:12-13).

Attorney and author, Lewis Walton Jr., once said that there is more truth in Scripture than just on the surface. "We have to go vertically in the Word," he said. In the paragraph above, we have done just that. This is the first step going vertically down into the Word. What did the original words mean that were used by the Prophets? Everything loses something in translation. Dig, as if for buried treasure, for there you will find gems of great value, Matthew 13:44.

A message from YHVH to the weeping prophet deftly describes the time in which we now live: Even the stork in the heavens knows her appointed times (mo'ed); and the turtledove, the swift, and the swallow observe the time of their coming; but My people do not know the judgment of YHVH.
How can you say, "We are wise, and the law (Torah) of YHVH is with us"? Look, the false pen of the scribes certainly works falsehood.
The wise men are ashamed, they are dismayed and taken: behold, they have rejected the word of YHVH; so what wisdom do they have? Jeremiah 8:7-9 NKJV

No disrespect to our readers who worship on Sunday, but YHVH did not ask for one day in seven. He asked for the seventh day (Gen. 2:1-3, Ex. 20:8-11). The Creator sanctified (set apart) the Sabbath at creation and never changed it. (See Mark 2:27-28) His resurrection on the first day of the week could not have sanctified the day. No change to a will can be made after the testator dies! In order for YHVH to change His will or covenant with us (the Sabbath-and feasts-are part of His perpetual covenant) He would have had to do so before Calvary. He did nothing of the sort, see Matthew 5:17-18. Isaiah 8:20 says, To the law (Torah) and to the testimony: if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them. If Messiah, or any other prophet or apostle had changed the Sabbath commandment or the feast days, they would be considered false prophets!

The beast shall speak great words against the Most High, and think to change times (mo'ed) and laws. How arrogant! Man can do nothing to sanctify time or make a day holy; but that has not stopped him from trying.

## LUTHERAN:

"They [the Papacy] allege the Sabbath changed into Sunday, the Lord's Day, contrary to the decalogue, as it appears, neither is there any example more boasted of than the changing of the Sabbath day. ## METHODIST:
